A top-five finish from sophomore Skyler Knight anchored Warrensburg girls cross country in the Gans Creek Classic on Saturday, Sept. 27, at the Gans Creek Recreation Area in

The girls finished fourth out of 29 teams in the green division with 226 points.

Knight placed fifth out of 227 runners with a time of 19:22.60. Senior Falon Hudson finished 33rd with a time of 20:57.30. sophomore Aleyna Michaels finished 66th with a time of 21:43, freshman Molly Christensen finished 79th with a time

of 21:58.40, sophomore Talita Wiederhoeft finished 82nd with a time of 22:03.10 and junior Alex Kientzy finished 96th with a time of 22:31.30.

The Warrensburg boys finished fifth out of 44 teams with 249 points. Junior Carson Heinrich finished 15th out of 347 runners with a time of 16:42.80, senior Elia Morgan finished 19th with a time of 16:49.30, senior Luke Youngblood finished 20th with a time of 16:50.50, junior Ross Broeker finished 82nd with a time of 17:59 and junior Evan Wittmaier finished 120th with a time of 18:31.80.

The Knob Noster girls finished second out of 21 teams in the white division with 101 points. Holden and Crest Ridge

also competed in the race, but did not qualify for team stand-

Warrensburg football's balance, takeaways topple Pleasant Hill

PLEASANT HILL — The number five carried several meanings in Warrensburg football's trip to Pleasant Hill.

Of course, five is the number of games the Tigers and Roosters have played this season. It is also the number of times they have met on the gridiron in the last 26 months.

More importantly, it is the number of Warrensburg athletes who ran the ball, the number of athletes who caught the ball, the number of touchdowns it scored and the number of takeaways it tallied.

Whether or not the commonality was a coincidence, Warrensburg beat Pleasant Hill 38-7 on Friday, Sept. 26, at Eklund

Field. "I thought it was a team win tonight in all phases," Warrensburg head coach Chris Cavanah said. "The offense did an amazing job running the ball and killing [the clock] in almost the entire fourth quarter. The defense came up with some big stops all game long. Holding them to seven points, it's huge."

The Tigers (3-2, 1-1 MRVC West) and Roosters (1-4, 1-2 MRVC West) exchanged a defensive battle through the first five possessions of the game.

During the span, Warrensburg punted the ball away twice. Pleasant Hill punted the ball twice as well, while also losing possession of the ball via a fumble recovered by Braun Lamone.

Pleasant Hill's second punt set the Tigers up at the Roosters' 48-yard line. Facing third-and-7 from the 45, sophomore quarterback Camden Mannering connected with junior Theo McCracken for a 30-yard gain.

A play later, senior running back AJ Smith ran the ball in for a 15-yard touchdown. Combining that with a PAT from

Mannering's 30-yard completion ended up being his third-longest of the night. Making his fourth career start, he completed a career-best 17-of-23 passes for 268 yards and two touchdowns.

"I think you're seeing Camden Mannering grow a little bit each week," Cavanah said. "We're able to add a little bit more to his plate each week. We're starting to take off."

Following Mannering's first score, Pleasant Hill responded with a drive that ended with a 6-yard pass from senior Sawyer Richcreek to sophomore Odin Hudson on fourth and goal.

After that series, Warrensburg's defense went on to intercept Richcreek four different times.

The total included three from sophomore Trevin Shaw and one from junior Jalen Ruble.

"I thought that defensively, we had a really good game plan going in," Cavanah said. "Our kids executed it at a high level on that one ... We've played Pleasant Hill enough times in the last couple of seasons that we know what they like to do and how they like to do it. There's a lot of familiarity there. The kids did a good job in preparation and a good job in making plays."

Before the first pick was tallied, the Tigers' offense scored on an 11-yard connection between Mannering and junior Dorian Lee, retaking the lead.

Shaw went on to intercept Richreek for the first time, coming down at the Pleasant Hill 46-yard line. Warrensburg made it 17-7 via a 26-yard field goal

Ruble intercepted Richcreek after, giving Warrensburg the ball at its own 40-yard line. A 60-yard pass from Mannering to sophomore Dominik Maham followed.

Shaw also had two other interceptions before the game went into halftime, with Warrensburg up 24-7.

"It was great," Shaw said. "We all played. All of us on 11 cylinders. Everybody did their job. The ball came to me, and we got one to Jalen ... I was shaking. I saw the ball come my way, like I was getting blessed. It was an awesome sight to see."

Warrensburg scored twice in the second half, coming via 27-yard and 40-yard runs from sophomore Hunter Michel in the fourth quarter.

The Tigers tallied 520 yards

Off of Mannering's 268 passing yards, McCracken had five receptions for 110 yards, Maham had five catches for 96 yards, senior Cruz Villegas had four catches for 34 yards, Lee had two catches for 15 yards and senior Tucker Small had one catch for 13 yards.

Smith ran for 156 yards, crossing 1,000 rushing yards on the season for the thirdstraight year.

Michel ran for 99 yards on 11 carries. Villegas had one rush for five yards.

"Our offense continues to evolve to our current personnel," Cavanah said. "I think our offensive line is getting better each game. We're able to hang our hats, and they can be physical up front, creating some holes for our running game."

Warrensburg, which has now held its opponents to single-digits in three of its five games, hosts Odessa on Friday, Oct. 3, at the Warrensburg Activities

"We're going to have a lot of confidence coming in the next few weeks, that's for sure," Shaw said.

> — Pueblo on Sept. 11. Senior Jordan Pachot took over in the fourth quarter of that game and started against Missouri Western on Sept. 20.

"It was a little draw play, which is numbers," Omolo said of his rushing score. "There are kind of three different decisions on the play. I can throw it here, run it. Just kind of numbers. Pre-snap, we ran three guys over here. They had three. The back was in the box. But then, I just had the ball and I kind of ran out, so it kind of parted. I just took it from there."

The rushing score was one of six against the Lions (2-2, 0-2 MIAA). UCM had a season-best 325 rushing yards, including 114 yards and two touchdowns on nine carries from junior Latravious Boyd.

Seven different Mules ran the ball in the win. Alongside Boyd and Omolo, sophomore LaAngelo Bell ran for 63 yards on 11 carries while redshirt sophomore Keyon Butler ran for 39 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries.

"That was kind of a big point of emphasis for us," Central Missouri head coach Josh Lamberson said of the run game. "We challenged the offensive line. Coach [Joe] Holtzclaw and Coach Hayden [Hawk] did a great job of really kind of creating a game plan in which we thought we could exploit

some things and be successful. Use our strengths to our advantage."

Omolo's touchdown was the only score of the first quarter. UCM went on to halftime.

The second quarter included a 1-yard touchdown run from Butler, a 63-yard touchdown run from Boyd and a 15-yard touchdown run from Boyd.

"We're more of a passing team, but we're going to do whatever we feel is an advantage for us," Lamberson said. "Today, having 325 rushing and 295 passing, that just speaks volumes about the people we have on this football team, the abilities we have on this football team. We can be a dual threat. It doesn't have to be where we have to sit there and throw it for over 300 plus yards in order to win. That doesn't have to be the case."

UCM also scored on a 20-yard pass from Omolo to junior Marlon Lindsey Jr., along with a pick-6 from redshirt sophomore Trey Patrick, before halftime.

Patrick finished the game with two interceptions. He returned his first 30 yards for a touchdown.

Central Missouri tallied four takeaways in the game, joined by fumble recoveries from redshirt sophomore Kyan Franklin and freshman Iosefa Toia.

"I'm extremely proud

of Trey," Lamberson said. "He has worked really hard to put himself in the position to have some success today. We went zero blitz on his interception build up a 42-7 lead by and Rich [Wright] just kind of rolled the dice. They were actually calling the play. They knew the play was coming in that situation. Trey was able to get a jump on it. The next time they go out there, kind of the same thing. If you look at it, he was doing exactly what he should've been doing. He was in the right place at the right time because of the scheme and the techniques he is being taught."

In the second half, the Mules scored through a 3-yard touchdown run from Butler, a 23-yard field goal from redshirt sophomore kicker Will Peacock, a 1-yard touchdown run from redshirt sophomore Mac Harper and a 34-yard field goal from Peacock.

Junior Jake Weber led UCM in receptions, tallying eight catches for 82 yards. Junior Andre Jackson had six catches for 52 yards and Boyd had four catches for 46 yards. The Mules had 10 receivers tally a catch.

Central Missouri continues its season at Central Oklahoma on Saturday, Oct. 4. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m. at Chad Richison Stadium.
